Police Shared Services Project:

The Towns of Shelburne & Buckland were awarded a \$200,000 grant from the MA Division of Local services to explore developing shared police services between the two towns. The grant will fund development of a shared services agreement, a community engagement and information sharing process over the coming year, interim funding for police staff, and, if the agreement is approved by both towns, infrastructure improvements at both police headquarters buildings to facilitate a new office configuration. The grant was awarded by Lt. Gov. Karen Polito at a state-wide grant award ceremony for Regionalization & Efficiency grants held in the Buckland town hall on March 24.

CPA Update:

The working group Shelburne residents exploring adoption of the Community Preservation Act (CPA) held a 2nd public forum on February 16. The group invited Judy Loughlin of the Whately Community Preservation Committee to share Whately's experience using CPA funds from the town's voter-approved 3% surcharge on local property assessments to do community improvement projects in the areas of Open Space, Recreation, Historic Preservation and Community Housing over the past decade. Village Taskforce Forming – a Few Seats Still Open:

At a recent "Village Summit" convened in March by Jessica Atwood (FRCOG) and Amy Shapiro (Franklin County CDC), participants agreed to create a Village Taskforce to bring together voices representing village businesses, residents and municipal officials in order to improve communications, direct community energy toward village events and improvement projects, and explore options for creating a successor organization to the now defunct Greater Shelburne Falls Area Business Association. Summit participants agreed on a structure of up to 11 participants, with 5 representing village businesses, 4 representing residents of Shelburne and Buckland (2 from each town) and 2 representing municipal government boards (1 from each town).

In the first round of nominations, 7 people nominated themselves to serve. They include 3 business representatives: Ann McCormack – Water Street Barn, Missy Elie – Rethreads and Holly Sontag Ramirez – Blue Rock Restaurant. **There are 2 more open seats for village businesses.** John Wyman and Deborah Yaffee stepped forward to serve as Buckland residents and Brianne Benness will serve as a Shelburne resident. **There is an opening for another Shelburne resident.** Andrew Baker agreed to serve as a Shelburne municipal rep if no other Shelburne board member steps forward. There is an open seat for a Buckland municipal rep.

CDBG News:

The Town of Shelburne has received a \$700,000 Community Development Block Grant to complete Phase 2 of the Bridge Street reconstruction project. The grant will fund reconstruction of the street and sidewalks on Bridge Street between Baker Ave. and Mechanic Streets, replacement of the water main, new hookups for fire suppression systems and new street trees. In order to minimize traffic disruptions in the village business district during the busy spring/summer season, replacement of the water main will take place in September and repaving of the street and sidewalks will take place in Spring, 2023. Replanting of street trees to complete the Phase 1 project between the Iron Bridge and Baker Ave. will take place this Spring – dates for the work still to be scheduled.

COVID Testing Updates:

- Starting April 1st, the free COVID community testing site at Greenfield Community College will close. An up-to-date list of local places to get a COVID test can be found at <u>https://frcog.org/covid</u>. If you do not have internet access, please call 2-1-1 to find a testing site.
- **Take-Home Tests** donated by Massachusetts Dept of Public Health are available to walkins at the Greenfield Health Department, the FRCOG, and all FRCOG Public Health Nurse Walk-In Wellness Clinics. Call 413-774-3167 x156 for more info.
- **Private insurance and MassHealth now cover rapid antigen tests** to have at home (up to 8 tests/4 boxes per month).
- **Private insurance** may allow online orders or reimburse the cost of the tests from a purchase receipt from a variety of retailers. Check with your insurance company about your coverage.
- If you have MassHealth, in-person pick up can ensure that your rapid antigen tests get covered:
 - At Big Y, Rite Aid, Stop and Shop and Walgreens, bring the tests (before purchasing) to the pharmacy to bill MassHealth directly.
 - At CVS, call the main store number (not the pharmacy) and order tests for pick up and they will bill MassHealth directly upon checkout.
- Free N95 masks (max 3 per person) are available at Baker's Pharmacy and at the pharmacies listed above.

Hiking and Walking in Shelburne:

The Shelburne Stone Fire Tower Trail, Big Trees Trail, and Ridge Trail to the High Ledges – The Stone Fire Tower Trail is a relatively short, but demanding hike up to the Shelburne State Forest - Fire Tower located on top of Massaemett Mountain. The <u>Big Trees Trail</u> bypasses some of the steepness of the lower Tower Trail and includes numerous interpretive panels and tree identification tags. The fire tower offers window views in all four directions. For those wishing a longer hike, the <u>Ridge Trail</u> on top of Massaemett continues on to the Mass Audubon's High Ledges Wildlife Sanctuary, with its spectacular <u>High Ledge</u> view of the Deerfield River Valley. You can approach the Fire Tower from either Shelburne Falls or the Audubon High Ledges parking area. **Map & Brochure, 3-pages.**

<u>Tick Season Is Here</u>! - Ticks can be disabling or even deadly, and may be too small to easily see to remove. It is recommended you pre-treat your clothing with Permethrin for six weeks of protection. Allow your clothes to dry before you put them on. <u>Never</u> apply Permethrin to your skin. Lacking Permethrin, you can always use a product containing Deet, but it may not be as effective and you need to apply Deet prior to each hike off the pavement. For added protection, tuck your pants into your socks and check for ticks when you are back on the pavement and at home.

Editor's Essay – Shelburne Voices in the Walls:

It's been a busy construction winter on Mechanic Street, with three dumpsters filling up on our block alone! Andrea and I are finally renovating the rooms on our 2nd floor, one of many projects we've taken on since we moved to Mechanic Street 24 years ago. Fixing up an old house gets a person thinking about the people who lived in it before. In our case, a long time before as our Greek Revival was built in 1857.

We like to do the demolition part of our fix-up projects – in part to save money on the work we can do ourselves, and in part because it provides a fleeting opportunity to see the layers of the past revealed as we strip away the 1970s-era fake wood paneling and the well-trodden wall to wall carpeting. You can see the choices made by long-ago occupants in the layers of old wallpaper. And every now and then interesting oddments fall through the plaster lath.


One small gem I'm sharing with you in this April issue is pictured below – a business card size booklet that somehow fell through the attic stairway and into the neighboring wall. It is a dance card for the Merchants Hose Concert & Ball held in Brattleboro, VT on Wednesday, April 4, 1888. Inside is a cover page describing the program and musicians followed by a two-page listing of all the dances – waltzes, polkas, quadrilles, a gallopade, Prince Albert's Reel, Portland Fancy, Chorus Jig – and room for dance partners to reserve a dance. Was this dance card wielded by the matron of the house – a mother of many with a friend or relative in the Merchants Hose Fire Company? Was she perhaps a young bride just married to an immigrant mechanic at the Lamson Cutlery? Or maybe a teenage daughter going to her first dance?

All we know is that someone named "Chris" signed up for a Contra at dance #7 and someone else less legibly requested the Lanciers. I only hope that when she got to the ball she was too busy dancing to fill up the rest of her dance card!

Who do you imagine she was? As it turns out, I happened to be reading Willa Cather's "My Antonia" in between swings of the sledgehammer – a marvelous memoir-styled novel about life on the Nebraska prairie in the late 19th century, and the friendship between a young boy and his immigrant neighbor Antonia, who hailed from what was then Bohemia (now the Czech Republic). In it Cather describes the arrival of a group of musicians who set up a tent on the town green and the excitement that erupted across the county when Saturday night dances were offered. I wonder if the same sort of social mixing occurred in more established New England towns. Did farm boys and merchant's sons compete for the chance to waltz with servant girls and factory workers? My Mechanic Street dance card holder has been boldly colored into my imagination by Willa Cather's Antonia and her Swedish girlfriends.

How would she have gotten to Brattleboro that evening in 1888? What for us is a half hour car ride up the highway would have been a half day horse and buggy ride on dirt roads. Or maybe she would have walked up muddy streets in town to the train Depot behind the granary (now the Salmon Falls Artisans Showroom) to ride the train to Greenfield, and then waited for another train up to Brattleboro. Either way, it was an expedition, perhaps with an overnight stay in the big city. Food and clothes to pack. Horses to manage. I wish for her that the dancing and the fiddle music made for a memorable journey that April evening 134 years ago.

"One more dance with your favorite partner, one more chorus from the fiddler's bow, Follow the plow, the pen, the needle for one more year and down one more row. Tree of life, hand of friendship, stepping stones in an endless chain – Cut the strings that make you dance, you will still be dancing just the same...." --- from the song, "Endless Chain" by Pete Sutherland (Metamora)



That's all we wrote!
