Town Hall News

As promised in <u>last month's newsletter</u>, Shelburne Town Administrator Terry Narkewicz provides these **updates on the Bridge Street construction** project.

Sewer System Improvements. Sewer improvements on Bridge Street have been



completed. At the request of the Shelburne Sewer Commissioners, additional sewer work from the Bridge Street / Main Street intersection down Main Street for

approximately 60 feet, will begin on **May 2**. This sewer work is expected to last at least until Thursday **May 4**. Sewer work will impact the drive-up teller windows for Greenfield Savings Bank and M&T Bank during this time.

Water System Installation. The contractor is in the process of bringing new water services to

the buildings' foundations, having completed installation of new water main. Building owners will contract separately to bring the

new services into their buildings and connect to interior plumbing. Once testing has confirmed the water in the new water main to be potable through testing, the contractor will begin switching buildings over to the new water services. Cutover from the old water system to the temporary water supply will result in a short interruption of service; the contractor will provide a minimum 48 hours of notice when the cutover will occur.

Projected Completion Date: May 12

PROPERTY OWNERS:

Paving. The road surface will be reclaimed, graded, and a new layer of pavement laid after



the new water system has been installed and the temporary water bypass has been removed. (Final road surface paving will occur in the fall.)

Projected Start Date: Week of May 15.

Sidewalks. New sidewalk construction will begin after the May paving, a section at a time,



removing and pouring the sidewalk just in that section. The contractor has been instructed to maintain building access at all times and will install temporary

ramps to building entrances.

Projected Start Date: Week of May 22.

Trees. The two Honey Locust trees in front of Greenfield Savings Bank will be **relocated**.



Anyone interested in providing a new home for the tree(s) should <u>contact Town Administrator</u> Terry Narkewicz at (413) 625-0300, X1.

Traffic and parking changes during

construction. Pedestrian traffic will be accommodated to ensure that patrons have safe access to local businesses. Police details will be used to control traffic, as directed by the Police Chief. There will be limited parking in the project area on the north side of Bridge Street during water line work. Sidewalk construction will also temporarily eliminate parking in the section of sidewalk where work is occurring. Paving will require that traffic be detoured.

Management Committee, along with some other town residents, got together and conducted an **After Action Review** (or, 'AAR' for short) of the town's response to all

the emergency incidents brought about by the three days of wind and heavy snowfall. As you can imagine there was a lot to talk about.

AAR's are an excellent method of reviewing previous actions that occurred in an event and learning from them. There are four focal points of the AAR as it relates to our response:

- 1. What was the **expected** response?
- 2. What was the **actual** response?
- 3. What went wrong and why did it go wrong?
- 4. What went well and why did this go well?



Honest answers to these questions can be quite an eye opener. AAR's are an excellent learning tool.

Our AAR report lists twelve issues that we discussed and improvement recommendations for each one of them. These recommendations are now on the committee's "To Do" list.

OPEN SPACE COMMITTEE

Jim Perry of the Open Space Committee announces a **guided hike to Mass Audubon's High Ledges Wildlife Sanctuary** in search of Pink and Yellow Lady Slipper Orchids. Pink Lady Slippers are shown in the photo below.



The Shelburne Open Space Committee,
Deerfield River Watershed Association,
Shelburne Falls Senior Center, and Arms
Library have partnered to lead the **scenic and educational hike**. The even more rare <u>yellow</u>
<u>Lady Slippers</u> are listed as "Endangered" in
Massachusetts.

What to Bring: Hikers should wear good walking sneakers or hiking boots and bring water to drink, a snack, sunscreen, and tick repellant or treatment. (The most effective tick treatment is to pretreat your clothing with Permethrin!)

What to Know: This very popular 1.4-mile round trip hike is rated as slightly moderate; mostly follows a hilly, dirt road; and its goal is a

cliff ledge with **amazing views** of the Deerfield River Valley to the west. And, if we have timed it correctly, plenty of Lady Slippers to view. We will discuss the history of the area and will also point out other hiking trails. There will be plenty of discussion stops along the way. The drive and hike will most likely take about **2 1/2 hours**.

Where to Meet: Meet at the front steps of the Arms Library in Shelburne Falls at 9:00 AM on Sunday, May 21. We can then drive individually or carpool the 6.4 miles (12 minutes) to the trailhead from there. Carpoolers will need to wear COVID-19 suitable masks in the vehicles. Or, you can meet us at Audubon's first trailhead parking lot off Patten Road, at about 9:15.

SHELBURNE FALLS FARMERS MARKET



The Shelburne Falls
Farmers Market **begins on Friday, May 26** and will be held weekly at 2 - 6:30 PM until the last Friday in

October (fall hours are 2 - 6 PM). Located on the Baptist Green owned by Trinity Church at the corner of Main and Water Streets, it is just a few minutes walk from downtown.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Andrew Baker submitted three updates about area capital improvements.

1 Shelburne Falls Pocket Park

Construction on the new pavilion at the Town's new "pocket park" at the corner of Bridge St. and Deerfield Avenue has **started**, but is taking a pause for the summer. Eric Dean and Pete Hillman installed the six pre-case concrete piers for the pavilion columns in March (see photo) and then turned the site over to the Franklin County Tech School carpentry program to build the pavilion.



Sadly, their start was **delayed** by late winter storms, COVID and permitting delays. They began building the pavilion columns but then learned that the **roof trusses could not be delivered** before the end of the school year. So.... we decided to back up, clear the site for the summer, and invite the Tech School to **begin again in mid-September** when they are back in school. The picnic benches will be back on site for the summer and the park can be used by the public all summer long.

Planning is underway for **landscaping** the site and building **gardens**. The Town is in conversation with the Bridge of Flowers committee to use the park as a **temporary home for Bridge plants** next fall, when re-construction may begin on the Bridge of Flowers. Stay tuned for more on that \$2.3 million grant project.

2 Solar at Mohawk Trail Regional

If you've driven by the Mohawk Trail Regional **High School** on Route 112 lately, you may have noticed a large new solar array on the south-facing green metal roofs. The school district has entered a Power Purchase Agreement (PPA) with Solect Energy to install and operate the 250-kw system at **zero cost** to the District, and to dismantle it at the end of its 20-year operating life. The District will be able to meet 75% of its electricity needs with solar energy from this system and will receive electricity at a discounted rate for the next 20 years. The system still has several components that need to be installed before the system is operational. It is expected to begin producing power next fall.



3 LED Streetlights

The question of **how to proceed** with converting Shelburne's streetlights from the current sodium vapor lights, which Eversource is phasing out, to new LED lights, is still unresolved.

Selectboard chair, Andrew Baker and Town Administrator, Terry Narkewicz, will be meeting with Eversource in the week of May 1 to **gather more information** about the options.

Eversource has offered to replace the Town's 99 streetlights with 30 watt shielded LED lights at no cost to the town. However, many village residents have expressed concerns about the stark white color, the brightness and glare of the demonstration LED lights that have been installed on Main, Church and Water streets.

The Energy Committee has requested to review alternative options before any more new LED lights are installed and report its findings by August 1. The Select Board will review the matter again at its meeting on May 8.

BULKY WASTE DAY

Franklin County Waste District's Amy Donovan shares that Spring Bulky Waste Day occurs on May 13 this year at three sites, including the Mohawk Trail Regional School at 26 Ashfield Rd. She notes that while they can take many items such as tires, appliances, furniture, propane gas tanks, and TVs, they will not accept mattresses and box springs, which must be recycled. There's no need to pre-register for the event.

NEW REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE GUIDE

FCWD's Amy Donovan also announced that the annual Reduce, Reuse, Recycle (RRR) Guide for Hampshire and Franklin Counties is now available. The information in this 32-page guide is local, accurate, and up to date, and explains that YES, your recyclables (including plastics) ARE recycled!



Use the guide to learn about transfer stations and hazardous waste collections in Franklin and Hampshire Counties, textiles recycling, composting, how local

businesses can get free recycling assistance, and more. It includes a "What Do I Do With...?" A to Z disposal guide, which lists local and national recycling or reuse options for Aerosol cans to Yoga mats. You can use the link to read and download the guide, or bookmark the page for answers to your future disposal questions. WATCH OUT FOR TICKS, PART 2

Community Health Educator and epidemiologist Maureen O'Reilly of the FRCOG Public Health Team has additional information about dealing with ticks, now that the little buggers are back:

To paraphrase what Jim Perry of the Open Space Committee said last month: Spring is here and so are ticks! Jim provided some great information on how to pretreat clothing with permethrin and how to repel ticks using DEET.

This month, the Cooperative Public Health District, working on behalf of the Shelburne Board of Health, would like to provide some **guidance in the event of getting a tick bite**.

Although it can be hard to feel, you've been bitten by a tick if the tick is attached to your skin. **To remove the tick**:

- 1. Use fine-tipped **tweezers**.
- 2. **Grasp the tick** as close to the skin's surface as possible and **pull upward** with steady, even force. If the tick breaks in half, try to remove its mouth from the skin. If you can't, leave it alone and let the skin heal.
- 3. Clean the bite area and your hands thoroughly. Continue to check the bite area for several weeks; if you develop flu-like symptoms or a rash, see a doctor.



If you remove a tick from a person or a pet, you can submit it to be **tested for pathogens**, which carry diseases. As a Shelburne resident, you can provide your tick to be tested at a reduced rate of **\$15 through tickreport.com**.



If you find a tick, you can **submit a picture** of it to <u>TickEncounter</u>, through the University of Rhode Island, which can provide identification of the **type of tick**.




Tick Removal and Testing

If you do get bitten by a tick, remove the tick:

- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible and pull upward with steady, even force.
- 2. If the tick breaks in half, try to remove its mouth from the skin. If you can't, leave it alone and let the skin heal.
- 3. Thoroughly clean the bite area and your hands.
- 4. Check the bite area for several weeks; if you develop a rash there (or have a fever at any point in that time-frame), see a doctor about getting tested for Lyme and other tick-borne diseases.









How to get a tick tested:

If you remove a deer tick from your skin, save the tick in a small, plastic bag. Log on to www.tickreport.com and follow the instructions for mailing the tick.

Many residents only pay \$15.00 of the \$50.00 cost of getting a tick tested.

Local Boards of Health, in conjunction with the Cooperative Public Health Services of the FRCOG, have negotiated a reduced cost to most member towns. Identify ticks with the help of www.tickencounter.org
